Officials celebrate House passage of economic development bond bill

Bill, which includes \$2M for club, must now pass Senate

Boys & Girls Club of Greater Lowell members gathered with state and club officials July 2, 2024 to celebrate the state House of Representatives' passage of An Act Relative to Strengthening Massachusetts' Economic Leadership. Now in the hands of the Senate, the House version of the bill includes a \$2 million bonding authorization that will help fund the club's ongoing Believe & Become Campaign if it is included in Gov. Maura Healey's capital plan.

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LOWELL » Members of the Massachusetts House of Representatives celebrated last week's passage of the economic development bond bill Tuesday afternoon at the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Lowell, which will receive \$2 million through the bill if it subsequently passes the state Senate.

The Boys & Girls Club is in the middle of its Believe & Become Campaign, which centers largely on the expansion of the club's building at 657 Middlesex St.

So far the campaign has raised \$14.6 million, with a goal of reaching \$17 million for phase 1 of the project by July 31. The \$2 million authorization goes towards the building's renovations, which are aimed at creating educational and workforce programs for the club's teenage members.

Hadassa Pelissier, 14, has been going to the club since 2021, and has since witnessed firsthand the changes the club has gone through over the last few years.

"Seeing the impact our community has gone through, and the excited faces when the teens see the construction workers, it makes me proud to be a teen here," said Pelissier.

State Rep. Rady Mom filed the amendment to the bill, and was a club member himself in his youth in the 1980s.

"The club meant that much to me, and all of my family and friends as well to this day," said Mom while crediting fellow state Reps. Vanna Howard and Rodney Elliott for working to support the funding and

co-sponsoring the amendment. "We made this possible, that is to bring funding and continue with the club joy, and the club construction, that you guys can have a home that will sustain for many many years."

Howard said she was proud to file the amendment for the Believe & Become Campaign.

"Our youth, our teens deserve high-quality club programs," said Howard. "We are glad we could do a little bit to help the Boys & Girls Club to realize your future."

Elliott said he and his fellow representatives were pushing to help bring phase 1 of the Believe & Become Campaign to fruition. "We are down at the State

House, and we are going to do our part to bring this over the finish line," said Elliott.

Boys & Girls Club of Greater Lowell Executive Director Joe Hungler said he hopes for the Teen Center portion of the project to be completed sometime this coming winter.

"We're going to continue fighting, finding ways to make this happen for all of you," said Hungler. "I think that one of the most important things about this project for me is that throughout this project our teens have had a voice in what it looks like and what our needs are, and we are going to continue doing that going forward." State Sen. Ed Kennedy said in

a phone call Tuesday afternoon that he would support funding for the Boys & Girls Club being included in this bill, but he noted that it still needs to go through the Senate, which will present its own version before the two chambers go to conference to reconcile the differences between the two versions.

Kennedy also noted that this is a bond bill, meaning the project funding in the bill isn't a direct earmark, but rather an authorization for Gov. Maura Healey to borrow money for a specific project and to include it in her capital plan. If that does happen, Kennedy said the funding may still not be made available until at least January.
