

Lt. Governor Kim Driscoll visits the Boys & Girls Club

Middlesex Street was abuzz with activity on Friday, May 17th as Club staff, community members and elected officials anxiously awaited the arrival of Lt. Governor Kim Driscoll. This was an opportunity to share with the Lt. Governor the impact of the <u>Club</u> in the community, and to see progress on the <u>Believe & Become expansion</u> and renovation of the Boys & Girls Club facility. Upon arriving, and after introductions, the Lt. Governor took a look at the foundation for the Club's new addition, a Teen Center that will serve up to 250 teens per day.

From there, a peek into the new Teen classroom spaces where teens will have access to Workforce Development, STEM and Leadership programs (this will reside in the space that was formerly the administration wing of the building).



Several current and former Club teens spoke to the Lieutenant Governor on the importance of their Boys & Girls Club in their own lives and in the community. Former Club member and Youth of the Year Yvonne Welsh shared her gratitude for the Boys & Girls Club and the importance of giving members a new, renovated space.

"I am so excited about the new space at the Boys & Girls Club because it opens up so much more opportunity for youth in Lowell to grow and learn and develop," said Yvonne, who is graduating from Curry College as a commencement speaker, and is heading to Boston College to study for her master's degree. Next up was a visit with the Club's <u>Sports & Fitness</u> <u>Manager Devonna "D" Williams</u>, who connected with Lt. Governor Driscoll when they discovered that they more than likely played against one another in college - each woman is in their respective college's Basketball Hall of Fame. D shared a bit about how basketball is often how young people learn about the Club, and the importance of offering options such as an in-house league, a travel team and the summer peace League (supported by <u>Shannon Community Safety</u> <u>Initiative</u> and <u>DCR funding</u>). These programs are a gateway to developing relationships with caring staff, and an introduction to programs designed to help players envision their future after high school.



In the current Teen Center, two Club teens and two young alumnae shared how the Club has impacted their journey, citing mentors who believed in their success, encouraged them to step into leadership roles, and offered opportunities they might not have elsewhere.

The final stop on the tour was the Club's new kitchen, still in progress but easily identifiable as a much larger space than the kitchen that meals are currently served from. With this new kitchen, which is adjacent to the Community Center & Cafe, up to 350 meals will be served each day.

After the tour, a brief roundtable discussion was held in the <u>Community Center & Cafe</u>. More than 60 representatives from various organizations along with elected officials joined the roundtable. Various members of the community shared why they believe the Boys & Girls Club is an integral part of the community, and how the expansion of the Club will benefit not just more young people, but the neighborhood and the entire city of Lowell.

Until now, however, there has not been a space in the Club for the entire membership to gather for performances. The Community Center & Cafe was designed not just to be the space where members would gather to eat each day, but a space large enough to accommodate events, programs and community gatherings. A stage was an element of the design to support performing in the space.

The Club was fortunate to collaborate with the <u>Greater Lowell Technical High School</u> on this project. Students from the Carpentry shop, under the guidance of their instructors, built a new stage in the Community Center & Cafe.

It is hard to see with the green construction fence surrounding the facility, but the Teen Center addition is coming along nicely. The picture on the top shows the excavation of the site from November- you may remember the paved driveway that led to the back of the building that existed there previously.

The picture on the bottom shows the foundation of the Teen Center going up from today. Even in this photo it is hard to visualize the scale of the addition. The Teen Center will consist of two levels, the top being the entrance to the Teen Center that will be visible from the street, and include a Teen lounge and classroom space. The lower level will house the Music Clubhouse and Makerspace for all Club members.
